FRUIT TREE SIZES: Dwarf: 8-10' tall, Semi-dwarf: 12-15' tall

TART

Montmorency, #7, Semidwarf - Self-pollinating

PEACH

Self Pollinating, yields are higher when planted near different cultivars

Contender, #7, Dwarf - Self-pollinating

Redhaven, #7, Dwarf - Self-pollinating

Reliance, #7, Dwarf - Self-pollinating

ASIAN PEAR

Pollinate with a second Asian pear that is a different cultivar

Chojuro, #7, Dwarf

Raja, #7, Dwarf

EUROPEAN PEAR

Pollinate with a second European pear that is a different cultivar

Moonglow, #7, Dwarf

Red Anjou, #7, Dwarf

PLUM

Japanese/American Plum

Superior, #7, Semidwarf - pollinate with an Asian-American plum that is a different cultivar

Toka, #7, Semidwarf - pollinate with an Asian-American plum that is a different cultivar

NUTS

Hazelnut, American, *Corylus americana*, #7, mature size 10-15' - plant at least 2 for best nut production

Self-pollinating

UNIQUE FRUITS & EDIBLES

CRANBERRIES

Self-pollinating

Pilgrim, #2

MULBERRIES

Self-pollinating, but will have higher yields when planted near other Mulberries

Illinois Everbearing, *Morus alba* x *Morus rubra*, #7, unpruned mature height around 30'

Red Mulberry, *Morus rubra*, #3, unpruned mature height around 30' - Native

PAWPAW

Seedling Pawpaw, *Asimina triloba*, #3, mature height 12-15' - Cross pollinate seedling Pawpaws with another pawpaw

PERSIMMONS

Jiro, #7 - *Diospyros kaki* 'Jiro', self-pollinating, will have higher yields when planted near other Asian Persimmons

Native, #7 - *Diospyros virginiana*, unsexed, require both female and male for fruit

Meader, #7 - *Diospyros virginiana* 'Meader', partially self-pollinating, will have higher yields when planted near a male American Persimmon

SERVICEBERRY/ AMELANCHIER

Amelanchier Autumn Brilliance, #3 & #7, Clump, mature height 20' - Self-pollinating

TIPS FOR PLANTING FRUIT

- Plant fruit in full sun (a minimum of 6 hours of direct sunlight per day).
- Space plants far enough apart to allow for good air movement once they have reached their mature size (this helps prevent fungal diseases).

- A soil test done before planting can be extremely beneficial to your plants. The high quality [soil tests offered by the state of North Carolina](#) can help you determine exactly how much of what to add in order to create the ideal planting conditions. For instance, blueberries require a low soil pH and will not thrive in the incorrect soil. Soil boxes are in our Garden Shop. The tests are free from April 1st - November 30th.
- Fruit likes good drainage in its root zone. Amend your planting hole with 50% soil amendment ([Compost](#), [Soil Conditioner](#)). Your backfill should be 50% your native soil mixed with 50% amendment. When planting blueberries, consult their Garden Guide for specific recommendations.
- [Rock Phosphate](#), [Greensand](#), [Kelp](#), and [Azomite](#) are beneficial additions to the planting hole.
- Add a 2-3" layer of [Mulch](#) over the planting area. Mulch will help hold in moisture, keep roots cool in summer, and slowly release organic matter into your soil. Hold mulch away from the trunk of the plant. We carry multiple kinds of bagged mulch.
- Water regularly and deeply the entire first year (water twice weekly to the bottom of the root ball), and water during dry periods thereafter (drought can severely compromise fruit production).
- Remove any flowers/young fruit the first year, so the plant's energy goes into rooting.
- Weed-eating near fruit tree trunks can kill the plant. Be extremely cautious.
- **Enjoy your delicious harvest!**
