A Garden Guide

When we think of plants that cope with varying weather conditions we usually relate that to drought. Other factors like extended rainy periods, fluctuating warm and

cold winter temperatures, and sudden cold snaps also affect plant performance. Listed below are some plants, which perform well in a variety of weather conditions. This list is not all-inclusive.

All plants must have ample moisture until they become established – usually <u>about 1-2</u> <u>years</u> for most trees and shrubs. Well-drained soils are a must for most plants. If soil stays constantly wet, plant in another spot or in a berm on top of the soil. Adding amendments like compost, soil conditioner, and composted manures will improve soil structure and will provide plant roots a better condition to adjust to varying weather conditions.

HERBS:

Most hardy herbs prefer a dry, sunny area although mint, pennyroyal, and a few others can tolerate wetter spots. Lavender and rosemary are not dependably winter hardy. Basil is a very popular annual that loves hot weather – wait until after mid-May to plant it. Plant downy mildew resistant varieties.
